He has served as Priest in charge for the six churches in our Benefice since 2017/8 and we cannot express enough our thanks to him for his ministry and pastoral care during this time. Under his guidance our churches have continued to flourish and we will greatly miss his thought-provoking sermons and wise advice, tempered, as always, by his sense of humour. Who will keep us updated with the Cricket, Rugby and Golf results now? He has brought our churches closer together in fellowship and we look forward to this fellowship continuing after he retires. Our thanks also go to Linda, who has supported Martin unceasingly throughout his ministry. Both have become very good friends to many in the Benefice and for this we are very thankful. In Sweffling we have even more to be thankful for, since Martin was appointed Priest with special responsibility for Sweffling and Rendham after the Rev Cyril Stevens retired in 1994 and he looked after the two parishes for seven joyous years at that time.

We wish him and Linda a very happy retirement and our prayers and blessing go with them as they start the next phase of their lives.

Martin's last service will be a special Benefice service of Holy Communion at Dennington on February 25th, 11,00 a.m. The service will be followed by refreshments and will be an opportunity to say goodbye to Martin and Linda. Everyone is invited.

From the Reverend Martin Percival:

There is a saying in which the life of the Christian community is perfectly defined - The Church gathers for worship and scatters for mission. That picture is worth remembering. Week by week Christians meet together to worship God and then go their various ways both to tell others the good news of the kingdom and to serve them in whatever way God

calls. Thus, in George Herbert's poetic phrase, we offer God praise 'Seven whole days not one in seven'. I hope, such a sketch of how to be Christian is not new to you and already second nature to all who are reading this magazine. Many folk have passed on this vision of the Church's life faithfully in every generation.

At the heart of discipleship, often going without being noticed, there has to be a regular pulse and rhythmic beat. The gathering and scattering of Christian people is like breathing in and breathing out and is like the work the lungs do (which also we take too much for granted) which sustains life.

Nor can worship and mission ever be separated. They stand and fall together. Worship without mission is not just lame and watered down, it is not the genuine article. Nor can mission without worship ever be effective. Too often we mislead ourselves and think mission is an optional extra for the minority, but it is not. It is not a dimension artificially added to a Christian life from time to time when occasion demands. No, it is an indispensable part of the inner structure of the life of every disciple every day.

What is true, though, is that unless both worship and mission are strong and equal partners in the enterprise of Christian witness then our discipleship will be too weak to share in the Easter victory. Which points us to the heart of the matter, especially during Lent, which is the cost of discipleship. Being a follower of Jesus is a way of living and loving - God and others - but always with a cost to self. To be a Christian is morally challenging but also demanding in total commitment. So, in the weeks ahead, we hear Jesus saying again, 'take up your cross and follow'.

Just as the continuity between worship and mission must never be broken or separated nor must the continuity between Jesus' resurrection and his death. Ultimately Good Friday and Easter are not two separate events in Jesus' life but together the single unifying centre which gives meaning and power to everything he did and continues to do. That is the truth for our own lives and the truth we long to share with any who will listen and hear. *Martin*

Lyz Frankin writes regarding Ipswich Outreach:

I would like to thank the organisers of the Christmas Brunch in the Hut on 25th November and everyone who supported my stall. A total of $\pounds 66$ was raised on the day. During the year $\pounds 99$ was raised from sales of my surplus garden produce, copies of Andy's poetry book "The Ipswich Bus", and donations from Sweffling residents. The total amount sent to the charity in 2023 was therefore $\pounds 165$.

Ipswich Outreach is a charity which helps the homeless and those in need in Ipswich by running a nightly Soup Kitchen. The charity now has a purpose-built single decker bus, complete with serving facilities, seating, storage and two treatment rooms, which is used by the Soup Kitchen to distribute food and clothing, and by other agencies who offer support and advice to those in need.

Parish Council (PC) News: Report of December 2023 meeting Village Open meeting: National Grid Sealink and two other similar projects.

The National Grid, a private, not state-owned company, held a consultation afternoon in Saxmundham on December 3rd to outline plans to bring AC electricity onshore from North Sea windfarms, and transmit this, via underground cables, to three giant converter stations proposed to be built just to the east of Saxmundham, where it will be converted to DC electricity. More underground cables will then send the DC current to a huge substation at Friston and, from there, return cables to the sea and take electricity to converter stations on the Kent coast to provide AC electricity to London and the Southeast. A number of councillors attended this consultation and were very concerned that these plans would destroy Suffolk's coastal environment and were horrified at the scale of the industrialisation at Saxmundham and Friston. The PC held an open village meeting on Tuesday 12th December in the Hut and invited members of Suffolk Energy Action Solutions (SEAS) to address the meeting. Around 20 residents attended and unanimously agreed to oppose the plans to abuse the Suffolk countryside in this way. Although the meeting was not opposed to green energy per se, the PC has submitted a response to National Grid suggesting that converters be built in the North Sea, as was happening in other European countries, and that brownfield sites be used rather than destroying Suffolk's sensitive environmental sites and the tourist economy. Individuals were also encouraged to submit their own feedback.

Flooding in the village: The October flooding in the village affected 10% of Sweffling homes and the PC have been liaising with our District Councillors over the causes and possible actions to prevent future flooding. A village working party has been set up, led by Councillor Steve Ashurst, initially to walk round the village and record problems/blockages in the Gull, field ditches, culverts, road drains etc. He will attend a January public meeting in Framlingham with other residents and county and District councillors to see if Sweffling and other PCs along the rivers Alde and Ore can obtain funding for a village survey of watercourses, with a view to reducing the flood risk. **Vacancy for Sweffling Parish Clerk:** The PC wish to appoint a Parish Clerk, duties average 3.5 hrs per week, payable on the NALC clerk's pay scales for a suitably qualified person. Nature Notes February - March 2024

Last summer, a few of the fields in Sweffling had 'wildlife planting' around the edges, mixed plants designed to provide flowers for pollinating insects, and seeds for gamebirds and other farmland birds. More about these later in the year. There are also a couple of whole fields similarly planted, which now are paying off by attracting large numbers of birds. Seedheads such as Sunflower and Millet are being visited by flocks of finches, mainly Goldfinches and Chaffinches, such as are seldom seen in the fields these days. There may be others to look for. A similar field in Great Glemham attracted some 500 Bramblings, a scarce finch which sometimes visits in the winter (a bit like a Chaffinch, but with frosty white underparts, rusty sides, and a conspicuous white rump. We have

occasionally seen them in the garden in past winters). The birds tend to make forays into the field, and keep dashing into the cover of the nearby trees and hedges. Try the field on the right, at the top of Holden's Lane.

In December, I was shown a pair of birds which I take to be new to Sweffling. These were Egyptian Geese. They were on the floodplain meadow beside the Benhall Low Street

bridge, and I have heard that they were still around in January. This is a medium sized goose, with pale buff plumage and a reddish-brown back. Its most striking features are a dark patch around the eye, and large white wingpatches which show in flight. Despite the name, this goose is found all over Africa, the ones found here were probably introduced from South Africa in the 18th century as an ornamental species. They have since taken up residence in Norfolk, and are now widespread in East Anglia as a wild breeding bird, and spreading further afield.



The fields of sugar beet next door to us were harvested remarkably quickly in mid-January. I gather that they may be used for a wildlife planting later in the year. For a few



days the fields were used by foraging gulls, Blackheaded Gulls and Common Gulls. Common Gulls are not especially common in the South, and are mainly here in the winter. They look like small Herring Gulls, grey with prominent black and white wing tips. Greenish-yellow beaks and feet

distinguish them, and the dark eyes give

them a much kinder expression than the meanlooking Herring Gull! Have a look at the pictures if you don't believe me.

Birds come into spring song surprisingly early, especially in a spell of warmer weather. In the garden Great Tits are the most obvious, with their loud 'teacher teacher' note. Despite its simplicity,



this really is a song, produced only by the male, who is thereby defending his territory and attracting a mate. (Calls are also simple sounds, denoting alarm or hunger or other such signals). Other well-known garden songs include Robin and Blackbird, while that of the



den songs include Robin and Blackbird, while that of the Dunnock, which has been singing for a month and is just as common, is less familiar. Quieter than most, it is an attractive, rapid warbling song. It is worth getting to know it. My personal favourite spring song is the Mistle Thrush, typically singing early in the year. This has loud, clear notes, like that of a Blackbird, but shorter and simpler, and without the repeated phrases of the Song Thrush. Even in poor weather, it rings out as a sure sign of spring. *Geoffrey Abbott*
